#### REUNION NOTES

How much time did we have at the reunion to study what others had brought? Marjorie Swetland Scott gave a paper on her work which bears repeating to show what she offered to all of us. I would guarantee that you had no time to talk with her at the reunion. We were busy all the time. Her notes are as follows:

"My line is from Isaac's son John, followed by William, John, Luke, Joseph, Lord Butler, Fred Manley and Sterling. Mary Bishop and Roger Swetland are my direct relatives that are here today.

My mother, Dorothy Decker Swetland, for many years sent me items on the Swetland family. Thanks to her and my friend Anne Dimock who has a computer and has done all of my typing, I have completed the work done so far.

I have a collection at this time of eleven scrap books. The main one is the family book of all lines that I am still working on. Five books are of my grandchildren, a book of my husband and I covering our school days, his service during World war II and class reunions. I also have a notebook containing Swetland Lore, reunions, letters and what I call "Odds and Ends."

I have brought with me the DAR papers of six relatives showing the family lines. They are Marella Swetland Walter, Jennie Walter Young, Caroline H. Sponslor, Alice Swetland Crawford and myself, all filed under Luke Swetland. The other one is Nellie Amelia Morris Cressner, filed under William Gallup. They are here for anyone interested.

I have also brought information on "Creative Memories" which shows how to create your personal scrap books and materials."

Marjorie is well organized. She has accomplished more than many of us. Perhaps, the best thing she has done is to adopt a method and continue with it. It is not important to have the best system, only to have a system which works for you. All of us will benefit by doing the same with our papers, pictures, notes, photocopies and other data in our possession. William Dollarhide, a noted genealogist, has recommended that we use only 3-ring notebooks and that we use only  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11" paper for all entries in the notebooks. This does require that we commit the scraps to a full size page before we add them to our notebooks. If smaller, just paste them on a page. If larger, either fold them or use a reduced photocopy for the notebook.

At the 1995 reunion we talked about setting up a family archive. We can be sure that such an archive will not be useful to others unless the archive material is organized so that someone can learn what is there and where to find what they are seeking.

## RESEARCH

Time has been well spent at the Family History Center of the LDS Church in Beaufort, SC. Excellent and knowledgeable people staff the center. Searching through their records showed that two microfilms seemed interesting since they both had the name Swetland or Sweetland. They arrived in Beaufort and I have looked at both. The one mentioning Sweetland has the records of Leon H. Sweetland, sent to the LDS for microfilming by Esther Putnam who came to one of our reunions with Ruth Sweetland of Dryden, NY. It gives the name of his grandson who now has his records. I have the telephone number and will phone him to see how I can see part of them. The other mentioning Swetland has the correspondence of Lena Stevens of Harrison Valley, PA. Lena corresponded with my grandfather in the 1920s and 1930s about his ancestors. She included everything she learned about Swetlands, Stevens and Harrisons in her records. This microfilm says that it is only a partial part of her correspondence so it may be able to see the balance of it in the Pennsylvania State Archives in Harrisburg, PA. Now we know where they are.

Mary Jane Sweetland McLean, ae 29 1860 census, Algiers, LA, born in KY.

Boen Sweetland Bishop, possibly son of Agabus Bishop, Jr. who married Betty
Sweetland; February 22, 1790, Cumberland, RI.

Margaret Ables, 3503 North 2nd Street, LaGrande, OR 97850 Jo Ann Faubion, P. O. Box 125, Rathdrum, ID 83858

Charles Miner Swetland, born 1840 in PA, lived in NY, married Ellen L. before 1870. Ellen L. born 1845 in CT. divorced May 1885. Children were Charles Minor, born 1870, Harry Edward, born 1873, Walter E., born 1876, Mabel E., born 1877, Lola B., born 1880, Jake, all born either in Elko or Humbolt County, NV. Who are Charles Miner's parents?

Lynn Bradley, 2027 Kim Drive, Endicott, NY 13760

L. Lu Sweetland or Lorin Sweetland, father of Wallace Jay Sweetland, born October 19 1846, died January 4, 1912. Who is this man and who are his parents?

Carolyn Castle, 326 Cyprus Lane, Endicott, NY 13760

Sally Sweatland (1787-1850) who married Anthony Wright (1781-1854) She is buried in Squires/Wright Cemetery, in Lathrop, PA (near Hopbottom).

Sally Wright (1817-1857) who married Joseph Howley (1812-1888)

Data on both of these ladies is needed.

Ezra Swetland, born in Genesee County, NY, circa 1820, died Rushford County, NY 1888. Who were his ancestors?

Evelyn Isherwood, 4922 N. Peck Road, El Monte, CA 91732

Catherine Hart Sweetland, born about 1766, buried 1818

Both people resided in English Harbour, Trinity Bay, Newfoundland. Their children were Mary Beston Sweetland (1788), John Beston Sweetland (1790), Hannah Hart Sweetland (1792), William Sweetland, (1795), Martha Sweetland (1798) and James Sweetland (1804).
