Swetland Homestead in Wyoming, PA Undergoes Renovation

Mary Bishop has sent clippings from The Times Leader of Wilkes-Barre, PA from the September 15 and 17, 1999 issues.

This historic home in a New England style was built on property bought by Luke Swetland in 1796. The fist part of house was built by Luke's son, Belding, about 1803.

A summer kitchen and woodshed were added by 1815. About 1818 a second story over a parlor and dining room added two bedrooms.

About 1830 another addition was a kitchen which accommodated a coal-burning stove. By this date William Swetland, Belding's son, lived in the home. This addition connected the summer kitchen and woodshed with the rest of the house.

At some later date a veranda was added to the front of the house, as we saw it on the occasions we have visited there.

The renovators have selected the 1830 period as the basis for work. This means the veranda is now gone and will not be replaced. The project calls for work to finish by December 15th to permit opening the house for use during the Christmas celebrations.

Every effort is being made to recreate the the historic quality and fabric of the house. When next you see it, it will be as it was in 1830.

The Swetland Homestead hosted a Harvest Festival in September with traditional crafts, an apple pie contest, a Civil War enactment, musical entertainment, artwork, a coal mining exhibit and refreshments. If anyone attended the Festival, please send us a report for use in a later newsletter.

The renovation, estimated to cost over \$200,000, was funded by donations, most of which came from a major anonymous donation.

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Potter County, PA Courthouse Visit

On our return from the reunion in Chautauqua, NY, we went through Coudersport, county seat for Potter County, on the way to visit Gladys Swetland in Mills, PA. She still lives alone at the age of 107 although she is not able to get around well. Her mind is sharp and we had a delightful although too short visit.

We went back to Coudersport for the night and next morning stopped at the county courthouse for as along as I could then stand on my feet. It is difficult to find a place to sit and work at the courthouse.

In an hour and a half, I managed to go through some eight or so books of deeds. I was looking for the earliest deeds given to Gladys's father, Chester A. Swetland. Chester was a partner with George A. Walter in the lumbering business. The property was first owned by the business until Walter died and Chester bought out the balance of his share from the estate. I have sent the data to Gladys.

Next I wanted to know when my great-great-grandfather, Harmon Swetland, first bought land in Potter County. I discovered that he bought his first lot March 3,1866. His son, Austin A. Swetland, bought a house and lot in Harrison Valley on March 11, 1867. Austin and his son, Roger, my grandfather bought a lot on March 30,1883 and again on December 30, 1886. Time did not permit further research.

SFA 2001 Reunion

Her last letter has the words, "To make a long story short, was sorting over family history stuff to give to the Erie Historical Society." Later she wrote that "Can't give you all I got on Whitneys. If I counted right, I have around 672 pages or charts."

Yes, Hazel is in Doug's big book. You can find her on page 7 under her maiden name of Emory, born March 23, 1904. Since she has not written since, I assume she has died..

Hazel provided all I have ever learned about the descendants of Sarah Swetland, daughter of William and Agnes of Salem, MA. Through her Doug's book includes many more descendants of these two puzzling people. Puzzling surely describes two people, neither of whom left death records we can locate. Also Agnes's marriage to Simon Lovett is not recorded, only their children.

A Bruce Mystery

Do yo have any **Bruce** ancestors? This is the surname **Bruce**. In Roger Swetland's papers (my grandfather) are three handwritten pages. The handwriting seems to be my grandfather's. In alphabetical order Bruce men are listed from Abijah to Timothy.

All of these men appear to have served in the Revolutionary War.For all of the men he gives their year of enlistment and for most all their birth year and death year. He gives the names of spouse and children for many. He also names the people who contacted him. Inquiry dates range from 1895 to 1901.

If you know of anyone interested in the Bruce line. let me know and I will send a copy of these three pages to them.

At present I can fnd no Bruces among my ancestors or the any collateral lines. What could have been the reason for this recearch. The list includes Abijah, Benjamin, Jesse, Jonas, Joseph, Jotham, Lewis, Reuben, Silas, Simon and Timothy. Until I learn more, I am keeping these old pages.

Georgianna Swetland

Those who attended the reunion at Chautauqua were able to meet **Wayne C. Myers**, the grandson of Georgianna Swetland, a descendant of Theophilus Swetland. This makes her also a descendant of his father, Israel Swetland.

Wayne had sent me a chart showing her ancestry back to Theophilus. With the help of Doug's book, The Swetland/Sweetland/ Sweatland Family in America 1676-1997, much more was learned of her Swetland ancestry. At first she did not seem to appear in the book. A spelling difference made her hard to find. Further look showed her listed as Georgia Swetland. Since Wayne knew his grandmother and was 14 years old when she died, it is safe to believe that she was named Georgianna, not Georgia.

Georgianna's ancestry back to Israel is unusual. She is descended from two of Israel Swetland's sons, Joseph and Theophilus. She is also descended from two of Theophilus's sons, Eleazar and Ira.

Georgianna's parents were George Swetland and Jane M. Swetland. Jane M. Swetland was the daughter of Palta Swetland and Mariah N. Swetland. Yes, that's true! The surname at birth of all four of them was Swetland. She had two direct lines back to Israel, one of which with a side track in the ancestry.

Georgianna is then the greatgreat-granddaughter of Israel through her father, George, and also through her mother, Jane, and Jane's father, Palta

Through her mother Jane and Jane's mother, Mariah N., Georgianna is the great-great-granddaughter of Israel.

Georgianna's parents, George and Jane M., were third cousins. Jane's parents, Palta and Mariah, were first cousins, once removed. A relationship chart was essential to determine this relationship. If you wish to check this in Doug's book, mentioned above, the listing is:

Georgianna married James Louis Myers on June 6, 1881, Wayne's father,

Georgianna died in 1944. Wayne's father, Leroy Louis Myers, was born in 1903 and Wayne in 1930.

Knowing this one can trace Wayne, Georgianna, and Israel back to Isaac Sweetland of England.

Doug's book is a wonderful tool

in tracing families. Yes, it may have a few errors but the work is of great help to any family researcher. With the help of all who read this, these errors will be eliminated from the next version.
