William Wirt Smith, A Grandson of Benjamin Swetland, the Fife Major

The following, received from Susan S. Hahn, is the obituary for William Wirt Smith, son of James and Marcia Swetland Smith. Marcia was the youngest daughter of Benjamin and Rosanna Hancock Swetland. This is a very interesting account of her son, and gives a lot of insight into the culture of the times. (Susan made additions/corrections in parentheses).

William Wirt Smith, 1839-1903

Wm Wirt Smith, youngest son of James A. Smith (and Marci M. Swetland) was born in Chicago, April 4, 1839 on the present site of he Pullman Building, corner of Michigan Avenue and Adams St. Mr. Smith was baptized by the Rev. Flavel Bascom, in the first Presbyterian Church. Mr. Smith attended the first school in the city, Prof. Bennetts's, later preparing at Norwich, CT for Yale, and after two years returned to Chicago to join his father in business in the firm of James A Smith & Sons, manufacturing hatters and furriers.

About this time (1857) Mr. Smith joined the Scammon Light Infantry and was a Lieutenant in Col. Ellsworth's famous Chicago Zouaves.

Mr. Smith was a great-greatnephew, on his mother's side, of Gov. John Hancock, First signer of the Declaration of Independence, (Note: this is incorrect) and in his family is a Revolutionary Note Book of 89 pages containing a complete roster of the 23rd Mass Infantry and a list of stores and accoutrements of the same, recorded by his paternal grandfather, Sergeant Major Benjamin Swetland, together with an \$8.99 bill of 1776. They are now owned by his daughter, Miss Edna Valentine Smith.

His father, being President of the Northwest Fur CO, young Mr. Smith was soon after his return from college put in charge of the firm's extensive trading with the Indians of the great Northwest, which were vastly numerous at the time. The Company built

and operated among the first steamers, on a large scale, which plied between St. Louis and the remote waters of the Missouri River, carrying large cargoes of their own and government supplies for the forts and agencies en route. Bringing back on their return trip tens of thousands of deer skins, beavers, mink, otter, wolf and antelope, and from 100,000 to 150,000 Buffalo skins a year, to be sent all over this country and abroad.

His friendly intercourse with the Indians made him a valued mediary with the authorities in Washington, where he represented the conditions of the Chiefs Red Cloud, Rain-in-the-Face, Man-afraid-of-his-Horse, Medicine Bull, Iron Bear and others.

An amusing and typical episode, on one of these trips to the 'Great Father' (the President of the United States) was when Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Smith were sojourning there, with Mr. and Mrs. James A. Smith, on a trip of business and pleasure. The Chiefs were seated around the floor of the hall reserved for them, and Mrs. Smith was asked is she would like to see the celebrated red-men. With Mr. Smith and an interpreter, she went in with concealed trepidity. At once, there was a wild gesticulating and excitement, which was noticeably centered about Mrs. Smith and her fears seemed well grounded and she was quite ready to withdraw, when the interpreter told her the consternation was about her cloak, an imported wrap of plush, which had a long silken nap, of brown and white, that somewhat resembled fur and the Indian's curiosity aroused to know what kind of fur it was, and where the animal came from, as they had never seen anything like it out in their country, and the Chiefs told Mr. Smith to tell the 'paleface-squaw' that her coat would be much warmer if she would wear it inside out.

A notable event in Mr.'s Smith's Indian experiences in the Northwest was the 'Feast of the White Dog' in June 1865, at which Mr. Smith and his company there were the principals at that occasion, when 3400 Indians of the Mandans, Arica-Rees and Grosses Ventres, with two interpreters for each tribe, sat down to 'eat dog.' However, before the repast began, Mr. Smith escaped the ordeal by strategy.

Later on business interests made Mr. Smith a resident of New York, and while there he was on the Reception committee to meet and escort the Grand Duke Alexis of Russia, who was the second royal personage to visit this country. The Reception Committee, composed of Maj. Gen. MacDowell, Rear Admiral Gordon, Gen. John A. Dix. Henry Clews. Albert Bierstadt. Peter Cooper, Prof. Samuel B. Morse, J. J. Astor and others, with their ladies, numbering 100, sailed down the bay to greet the Imperial Highness, who with his fleet was accorded the naval and military honors that befitted his rank, and a banquet was served in his honor, while escorting him to New York, on the Reception Steamer, the Mary Powell.

Mr. Smith was a 32nd degree Mason, and a member of Astor Lodge on New York, and a member of the 2nd Presbyterian Church of Chicago.

Mr. Smith married previous to going to New York (1867), Miss Mary Susan Valentine Farnsworth of Detroit, MI. Their only child is Edna Valentine Smith, who was born in the old homestead, 1824 Prairie Avenue, and is the third generation to belong to the 2nd Presbyterian Church of Chicago.

Susan Hahn has sent other information which will come in later issues of S/S Lore. Two articles are on Edna Valentine Smith, the only child of William Wirt Smith and his wife, Mary Susan Valentine Farnsworth. More on William Swetland of Salem, MA

Using Google to search for the term "Swetland genealogy", a story came up from John Lambert Genealogy. The second paragraph of this reads:

"May 7, 1686, John Lambert sold to William Swetland, tailor, his grandfather's house in Beverly, next to the old meeting house and the burying place, which he had received from John Lambert, the first, and a parcel of land on Bass river and took in return for it Swetland's house, and Mar. 2, 1695, he sold to Daniel Bacon of Salem, fisherman, the piece of land in the South Field which his father had bought of Thomas Maule."

This suggests that William Swetland moved to Beverly, MA in 1686, which may explain why the birth of Benjamin Swetland in 1686 is not recorded in Salem, MA church records. So far Benjamin's birth is not recorded in Beverly records. Perhaps, William did not join a church in Beverly at the time of his move and Benjamin's birth was never recorded.

Isn't is curious how a bit of information comes up when least expected. Perhaps, other bits may come to light in the future which will answer some of the questions which puzzle us today..

House of Names.com

This is an organization devoted to surnames. Surname history costs \$16.95 and zooming in to the text will show you whether you are interested. You can also go to a coat of arms and see their version of the Swetland Family Crest. It is not identical to other crests which I have seen. Most likely all have been created by an artist using only a word description of the crest. Their page with the crest has a note reading, "We have researched the Swetland family crest in the most recognized sources. Before an artist or craftsman can render a family crest, it must exist. In other words the crest must have been designed and recorded by the heralds from time immemorial.? Do you understand what this says?

The Ira and Rose Swetland Family

From the Beeman genealogy we learn that Rosalia/Rosette Delight (Rose) Beeman born 10/25/1850 in Illinois married Ira B. Swetland, on 4/25/1869(?) From this marriage six children were born, Lillian Swetland, 10/14/1870, Lucy Amanda Swetland, 10/10/1871, Lucius A. Swetland, 10/12/1871(?), William D. Swetland, 1/18/1874, Ira F. Swetland, 3/11/1875 and Mary Elgia Swetland, 8/3/1883.

Some question about the birth dates of Lucy Amanda and Lucius A. should exist. Can births take place two days apart?

Under **Family Notes** it states that no further information has been collected.

Garnsey Family Papers

These papers are filed in the Division of Rare and Manuscript Collections, Cornell University Library. The primary sources of the papers were Cyrus Garnsey, Jr. and Cyrus Garnsey III. The description contains notes, clippings, and research material about the Sullivan Expedition and Luke Swetland. It would be interesting to learn whether the papers have new data on Luke Swetland. Does one of our members live close enough to research in this library?
