Message by New SFA President, Carol Gregoire



Hello Sweetland / Swetland family,

At the reunion in Gettysburg I was elected your president. Gettysburg was such a wonderful place to meet. On the bus tour of the battlefields that surround the whole town we learned so much. Our guide had studied the Civil War for forty years and he is still studying facts.

My husband,

Bob, and I have visited Gettysburg a couple times to visit the wonderful museum at the National Park Visitor Center. Since we've been antique dealers since 1979, we were interested in the artifacts of the soldiers. The exhibits helped us to recognize Civil War items which we have bought in Stuart, Florida where we live in the winter. We've also found items in Massachusetts in the summer when we stay with our daughter, Wendy Blanchard.

At our reunion Wendy and I shared what happened when a tornado struck towns in Western Massachusetts on June 1, 2011 that set a record of thirty-nine miles long. It passed through her property damaging two hundred trees. Luckily her home sustained only minor damage to the roof and chimney. After the tornado passed five trees rested on one end of the house. A sixty to seventy foot tree enveloped the whole roof and five trees were stacked in front of house and yet not a window was broken. By the next day the three churches in town provided food, clothing and volunteers. What a relief to have their help. We were overwhelmed by the amount of cleanup.

Within a week loggers had cut the pine trees. The logging left us with mounds of brush to be moved within ten feet of the road. The first pile was two hundred feet long and two stories high. Thanks to the volunteers who came from many states, even Florida, the cleanup took from June to Oct. when a blizzard hit causing more tree damage in all of New England. The final cleanup was a crew who turned brush into chips. This spring we had two house-sized mounds of chips to spread around Wendy's two treeless acres.

Wendy's home is being repaired by her Dad, her brother Alan and his son Justin. They built her a porch for shade. Next they'll shingle her roof. Her land is bar"When we die we become 'stories' in the minds of other people." -Unknown

MINUTES OF 2012 SFA REUNION, JULY 20-21 **GETTYSBURG, PA**

Friday, July 20th

At 4:30 pm family members gathered in the lobby of the Eisenhower Hotel and Conference Center to meet and greet family members. Goodie/gift bags from the town of Gettysburg were distributed.

After greeting new members and getting re-acquainted with old members we car pooled to Dunlap's Restaurant for dinner. Dinner was enjoyable and gave family members the opportunity to catch up on happenings within the families.

Saturday, July 21st

Members met at Gettysburg Battlefield Tours Bus Station at 9:30 am for a tour of the battlefield. The tour guide was very professional and enlightening. Even though it rained, everyone enjoyed the experience. After returning to the hotel, luncheon was served at 12:30 pm. Everyone enjoyed looking at the display of

family history and memorabilia brought by participants. The address book was sent around for signatures, addresses and e-mail addresses, although, not everyone had time to sign it.

SFA president Jamie Swetland called the meeting to order at 1:45pm. He elaborated on how interesting and informative the battlefield tour had been that morning.

The president outlined some new electronic formats that could be used for future reunions, such as videoconferencing or Skype. He said his biggest question was "WHY DO YOU COME"? This comment was made because of low reunion attendance. This question has long been asked of family members to see what they want on the agenda for future reunions. One comment from the floor was "To hear about the history in the area and anything pertaining to Swetland's."

Historian, Roger Swetland spoke of his research on soldiers who served in the Civil War, finding that 184 Sweetland/Swetlands/Sweatlands served in Civil War. Of these, three Swetlands, twenty Sweetlands, and four Sweatlands fought in the Battle of Gettysburg under the Union flag. Only one Confederate soldier was listed, William A. Sweetland from Virginia.

A very interesting and descriptive talk was given by Carol Gregoire and Wendy Blanchard about the tornado that hit Massachusetts in 2011. They spoke of the 39 miles of devastation which included Wendy's property. Fortunately, no family members were injured.

New business:
